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


CAMP LUTHERLYN

Palmarum

There was a time when many Sundays of the Church year were known by Latin names even after services were held in the common language of the people. Those names indicated the theme of the day based on the lessons and announced by the first word of the introit in the liturgy, a holdover from the original Latin Latin. Palmarum or Palm Sunday was different in that it denoted an object of great significance.

In ancient times when an important figure entered a city it was customary for the population to greet that person by laying their garments or branches on the way much like today's ticker tape parades without the litter left behind or as a souvenir of the event. The palm branch in the Roman Empire was considered a symbol of triumph and victory, in ancient Egypt it represented eternal life. The cutting of palm branches for celebration was part of the Jewish tradition commanded in Leviticus. This would have been a common practice for a crowd to greet a popular figure of the day.

Our Savior entered Jerusalem on a donkey which is significant in its own right. Horses were considered animals for war but the donkey represented peace; kings would enter cities on donkeys as a sign of peace unless they were coming as conquerers. The cries of hosanna in Hebrew were appeals to help or save but have now become cries of praise.

So many elements come together on this Sunday: the Prince of Peace enters the city riding on a donkey passing the crowds shouting 'hosanna' and waving palm branches along the way.

Let us join them and wave our palms and shout "Hosanna!" ~



SUNDAY OF THE PASSION / PALM SUNDAY The Heart of the Story

Martin Luther called the Psalms a "little Bible." He wrote that all the rest of the Holy Scriptures could be found in them. Luther went so far as to suggest that in the Psalms the church can glimpse the death and resurrection of Christ. In these ancient songs and prayers of the Hebrew people, every human emotion is laid bare: joy and contentment, anger and sorrow, hope and despair. The Psalms give voice to the wide spectrum of experiences that mark our human lives. This is their power—they speak the heart's language, turbulent as our hearts may sometimes be.

In a similar way, Holy Week places us at the center of the whole story of Christ's life, death, and resurrection. From the "hosannas" of Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem to the seeming abandonment of the cross, emotions run high this week as the story of Christ's passion reaches into the depths of our human experience. The palm and passion stories are themselves a "little Bible" of salvation for the church within the wider story of God's saving love for all.

As we gather to hear the story of Christ's passion anew, the words and rituals of the church's worship life invite us to feel our way into this story from the inside out. We hear the shouts of blessing and come to the Passover in quiet hope. We follow to Gethsemane and to the cross, with mixed emotions. What does betrayal feel like in our bodies? What about amazement? Fear? How have we experienced ridicule or shame? How have we ourselves dismissed or derided others?

The palm and passion stories offer us a chance to contemplate Christ's sufferings and meditate on our salvation—to come side by side with Christ's passion and so to know and access our own. We are invited to honestly glimpse the workings of our own hearts. Nothing is off limits to God's grace. No human experience is untouched by the story of God's redemptive love. ~



Oscar Arnulfo Romero, Bishop of El Salvador, martyr, died 1980 Sunay, March 24, 2024

Romero was deeply concerned with injustices evident toward the poor and powerless in El Salvador, and worked forthrightly against political repression. He was assassinated while presiding at the eucharist in a chapel near the cathedral in San Salvador.



Annunciation of Our Lord Monday, March 25, 2024

Nine months before Christmas we celebrate the annunciation, in which the angel Gabriel announced to Mary that she would give birth to the Son of God. The ancient

church believed that this was also the date of the world's creation and of Jesus' death on the cross.



Hans Nielsen Hauge, renewer of the church, died 1824

Friday, March 29, 2024

Hauge was a layperson who wished to revitalize the church in Norway. As a result of a mystical experience, he felt called to preach. Many professionals in the church feared his motives and influence, and he was imprisoned for leading unauthorized gatherings.
