

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Come Together

Last week I commented on the change of the service setting used in worship, perhaps it's time for a refresher in what we are actually doing during that time.

Singing is one of the important aspects of how a congregation comes together as one body in Christ. The Lutheran, Episcopal, Roman Catholic and Orthodox churches are considered liturgical because they follow a set structure for worship, sometimes called a Mass or Divine Service, based on historic precedents dating back to when the earliest Christians began to meet, in some cases using the old Greek or Latin words reminding us that when we sing we are the Christian Church of every time and every place!

Evangelical Lutheran Worship published in 2006 is the latest book for use as the guide to worship, liturgy, and singing, hymns and other expressions of faith; it defines certain elements essential to Christian worship: Gathering, Word, Meal, Sending. Each element is divided into specific actions with a purpose that we will look at over the next few weeks.

GATHERING: Sunday morning parishioners come together in the nave of the church, the volume of the organ playing often setting the tone of conversation in the building. The first thing to happen is The Confession of Sins, it is the acknowledgement of why we are here, we are sinners, and this is a way of wiping our feet before we enter God's House.

It is at this point we, as the congregation, get to sing. There is a hymn that ushers us into the Presence of God, often setting the tone of the service, followed by our expression of humility in the 'Kyrie', 'Lord have mercy, Christ have mercy'; and the recognition of our host, the Hymn of praise, 'This is the Feast of Victory' or 'Glory to God in the Highest', depending on the Church season.

Why sing you might ask. Aside from The Lord's Prayer, the 23rd Psalm, the Apostles Creed, it is hard for a large group to speak the same words together, music gives the sense of rhythm to the words that all can feel. Choral directors often have their groups read the words of a song to the rhythm of the notes, it's not easy, trust me! Singing words makes them easier.

What follows is the leader and congregation greeting each other in the name of the Triune God followed by the Prayer of the Day that imparts a sense of the theme of that Sunday's focus. You do remember the Church calendar divisions from previous articles as we are now in the green season of Pentecost?

Sacred Rest

The action-packed book of Mark may serve as an important reminder that faith is an embodied reality, shaping how we live, move, and interact in this world. An active faith looks like an unapologetic pursuit of justice, mercy, and healing for all in need. There was and still is no shortage of work to be done in the name of Christ. So, what do we make of Jesus' invitation to "come away . . . and rest awhile"?

In a society that values hustle and productivity above all else, true rest is profoundly countercultural. And yet, rest as a discipline has much to teach us about faith and life. Perhaps most importantly, rest reminds us that we are not God. It requires faith that God is still making all things new even while we step back for our own healing and nourishment. Rest reminds us that we do not bear the salvation of the world on our shoulders. This is good news!

Additionally, taking time to rest has the potential to restore us to community, by reminding us of our rightful place in the body of Christ. We are but one part among many, which allows us to approach our work with more freedom and joy than we ever could alone. We are called to do the work of ministry in community: we all alternate rest, work, and play so that, collectively, we can move toward liberation for all God's beloved creation.

We may find this sacred rest in many places, but perhaps one such instance is in worship. Here, we come away to be with our God and each other. We feast together. We celebrate, contemplate, and praise. We remember who we are and whose we are. And then, rested and nourished, we are sent back out—to go in peace, to share the good news, and to continue to serve our neighbors in Christ's name. ~

Mary Magdalene, Apostle Monday, July 22, 2024

Sometimes called "the apostle to the apostles" because she told them of her encounter with the risen Lord, Mary was a woman of Galilee who followed Jesus throughout his ministry. She was present at Jesus' crucifixion and his burial.

Birgitta of Sweden, renewer of the church, died 1373

Tuesday, July 23, 2024

Birgitta married at age thirteen and had four daughters. Widowed at age thirty-eight, she gave all that she owned to the poor, and founded a community of monks and nuns led by a woman. Her work is continued today by the Society of St. Birgitta.



James, Apostle Thursday, July 25, 2024

James and his brother John were the sons of Zebedee, fishermen by trade before their call from Jesus. He was the first of the twelve apostles to be martyred, and his death is the only one recorded in scripture (Acts 12:1-2).
